THE VICTORIANS

- Place the Victorian period on a time line. Research the life of Queen Victoria.
- Life as a Victorian child.
- Change in the education of children.
- The class system in Victorian society.

THE EGYPTIANS

The importance of the Nile to the ancient Egyptians. Compare of the rich and poor Egyptians in Ancient Egyptians. Explain the Ancient Egyptian ritual of mummification. Understand how evidence can give us different answers about the past. Use historical sources to understand aspects of the past (Howard Carter) Compare and contrast the powers of different Egyptian gods.

ANGLO SAXONS AND VIKINGS

Explore and distinguish the difference between invaders and settlers. Order events from the time of the Vikings and Anglo Saxons. Locate Anglo Saxon and Viking settlements. Identify places of Anglo Saxon and Viking Origins. Understand how the Anglo Saxons and Vikings have influenced Britain. Describe how the Anglo Saxons lived.

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WW2

Devise historical questions about change, cause, similarity and difference in relation to WW2. How our knowledge of Hitler is constructed from a range of sources. Knowledge of historical British society during evacuation.

Describe the social diversity of society during WW2.

Identify how the physical features affect the human activity within a location (how Tipton was bombed).

Write in a journalistic style about the Dunkirk landings.

- Compare different viewpoints from two authors about Victorian life. The industrial revolution.
- Victorian figure (Florence Nightingale).
- How Barnado changed the lives of children.
- Introduction of the Police Force.
- Victorian inventions

THE AZTECS

Place the Aztec era on a BC AD timeline. Research the origins of the Aztecs. Compare the Aztec way of life to our own. Use artefacts to investigate the Aztec period. Explain the impact of the beliefs of Aztecs.

Compare different view points of the Spanish Conquest.

Compare and contrast the Anglo Saxon/ Viking justice system with modern British justice system.

- Suggest why there may be different interpretations of events.
- Describe a main event from history from a particular point of view.
- Suggest why some events in History may be more significant than others.
- Design a Viking long boat fit for purpose.
- Understand the beliefs and rituals of Anglo Saxons and Vikings.
